Welcome to Forestry and Society!

I'm looking forward to this class, it's one of my favorites to teach. I love the outdoors and love explaining the importance of the natural world. We learn a lot of different topics in this class, starting with basic plant processes and functions, then about the importance of trees in our daily lives, the history of forests and the national parks as well as how government at the state and federal level affects our public lands. In the last part of the class, we look at the mental health benefits of being outdoors and how forests affect human beings.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate comprehension of basic plant physiology.
- 2. Analyze various environmental inputs and factors that affect trees and forests.
- 3. Identify forest biomes based on plant morphology and environmental characteristics.
- 4. Categorize different types of forest products and harvesting methods.
- 5. Compare and contrast various forest management practices in the US.
- 6. Evaluate climate and ecological issues as they relate to society.
- 7. Develop an awareness of the interconnection of nature and society.

Course structure

This class is 100% online and asynchronous but not self-paced. which means you do the work in your own time, though within the deadlines. All modules open on Fridays at noon and close 10 days later, Sunday at midnight. Everything you need is in each module and my goal is to make the course simple to navigate. You should expect to spend 4-6 hours on this course per week, including reading and the assignments for each module.

Fictitious citations generated by AI will be automatic deduction of one letter grade.
